	activities and CCA, your child is strongly encouraged to have 1 CCA instead of 2 CCAs. Also, come		
	sec 3, your child will be very busy with his/her academic subjects (subject combination) and start		
	preparing for their national exams in Sec. 4. It will be very challenging to cope with 2 CCAs and		
	school work. Furthermore, having 2 CCAs may not contribute to better CCA grades based on the		
	LEAPS 2.0 grading scheme.

	keyed, such as school events and WA dates. They can also key in their homework in the google		
	cohort calendar.

	Ans. Yes, students who bring their mobile phones to school are not allowed to use them in the classroom during lesson time. The school has installed phone sleeves in every classroom and students must deposit their mobile phones into the sleeves at the start of the day. This is to remove the distractions from the use of their mobile phones and help them focus on the lesson. They may use their phones during recess and after school. Students must be responsible for their mobile phones and ensure that they keep it safe.

	Ans. All students will take 6 common curriculum subjects with their form class classmates: (i) Examinable subjects including Art, Design & Technology, Food & Consumer Education (ii) Non-examinable subjects including Music, Physical Education, Character and Citizenship Education
	Students from PG2 and PG3 will also be offerred 7 compulsory subjects including English Language, Mother Tongue Language, Mathematics, Science, Geography, History and Literature at G2 or G3 subject levels. Subject level at the start of Secondary 1 is based on their PSLE Score and indicated by Posting Groups.

Students from PG1 will also be offerred 5 compulsory subjects including English Language, Mother Tongue Language, Mathematics, Science, and Humanities at G1 or G2 subject levels.

Eligible students may be offerred some subjects at a less demanding level from Secondary 1. Students who offer subjects at a less demanding level may subsequently be offerred the subject at a more demanding level as they gain greater competence and confidence in the subject.
